

It is important that your grant is used effectively and based on school need. Under the Quality of Education judgement, Ofsted inspectors consider:

Intent - Curriculum design, coverage and appropriateness

Implementation - Curriculum delivery, teaching (pedagogy) and assessment

Impact - Attainment and progress
